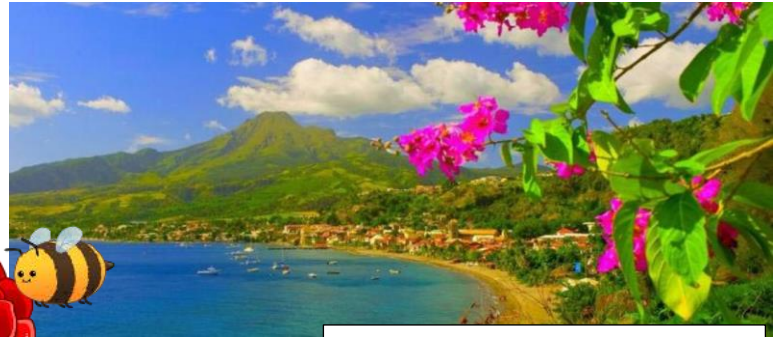
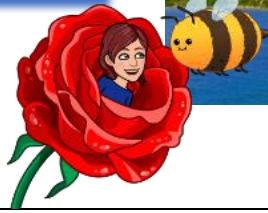

So what *is* happening in the French classroom? Students in the French 3 and Honors French 3 classes are currently engaged in a unit in which they are learning how to describe the habits that they have which contribute to a healthy lifestyle. Did you know...?



- There are approximately 220 million French speakers world-wide, 80 million of whom are native speakers. By 2050, this number is expected to rise to nearly 700 million!
- French is an official language in 29 countries across five continents.
- Approximately 45% of the English language is derived from French.
- The French language has the greatest number of homophones (words with the same pronunciation but different spellings and meanings). You might recognize some of these examples from French class:
ou / où est / et vert / vers / verre c'est / ces / ses / sait
- French wasn't always spoken in France. French is a derivative of Latin which was used in the country we now know as France for thousands of years.
- The *Académie Française*, a prestigious organization composed of 40 members known as *les Immortels*, was established in 1634 and continues to oversee the French standards of language and literacy.
- The letter “e” is the most common letter in the French language. And while some American words beginning with the letter “w” have found their way into the French language (*le wagon, un western*), there are no genuinely French words which use this letter.

Current happenings in the francophone community



As part of an ongoing effort to reduce its impact on the environment, France is one of the first countries within the European Union to work towards reducing carbon emissions by encouraging its citizens to travel using more eco-friendly modes of transportation.

Beginning this month, France will limit “short-haul” flights. Short-haul flights are flights to destinations which can be reached via TGV (*le train à grande-vitesse*, France’s high-speed train) within an approximately two and a half hour

journey. An example of a common short-haul flight would be a trip from Paris to Bordeaux, a city on the western coast, or from Paris to Lyon, a culinary city and popular tourist destination in the Alps. The limit on short-haul flights would not include trips from Paris to Toulouse or from Paris to Nice, which take about four hours and six hours respectively. International short-haul flights from Paris to larger cities like London, Frankfurt, and Amsterdam will continue to operate despite the nearly 2,800 kilometers of high-speed train tracks which connect them. France’s Minister of Transport, Jean-Baptiste Djebbari noted that “France has a specific railway network with many high-speed trains, making it suitable for travelers.”



Additional efforts to reduce carbon emissions are being taken by major airline carriers such as *AirFrance*, which in January became the first major airline to apply biofuel tariffs.

Leaders in Canada are working hard to save families money by signing country-wide early learning and child-care agreements with multiple provinces. This new initiative will help families to save \$2,000-\$6,000 dollars annually by providing parents with access to child-care services that will average a cost of only \$10 per day for pre-school aged children by the end of 2022. This \$30 billion investment by the Canadian government will not only return money to Canadian households, but it will also create new jobs and allow many Canadian mothers to return to the work force.
