5 TIPS FOR SUCCESS WHEN STARTING A NEW SEMESTER

1. Plan ahead. Read your syllabus early and identify important dates and deadlines. Note any large-scale project deadlines that may overlap in multiple classes.

2. Find study methods that work for you. Figure out what study space works best for you, whether it is your bedroom or the local library. 5. Take breaks when you need them. Pace yourself and plan ahead to avoid burnout. If you're getting tired or frustrated, take a break! Eat something, do an activity you enjoy, and rest your brain if necessary.
